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## **District Delays School Reopening**

DEC. 18, 2020 -- On Tuesday, Dec. 1, the Anaheim Union High School District (AUHSD) Board of Trustees voted to delay students' return to campus. The vote came as a result of Orange County returning to the purple tier on California's Blueprint.

Orange County's rising numbers of COVID-19 cases halted plans for students to return at the start of January 2021. Students are only able to return to campus if Orange County returned to the red tier, a recommendation by the Board of Trustees.

While some teachers are excitedly waiting for campuses to open, others are more apprehensive given current case numbers.

"It certainly would be wonderful to see (the students)," English teacher Kimberly Weir said. "But I know that the COVID cases have gone up again. I wish you all to be safe and take care of ourselves until we could all meet one on one."

Others, like math teacher Olivia Marinone are content with the current distance learning situation.

"I enjoy it!" Marinone said. "I'm able to work from home and still teach you all."

Since the start of the school year, teachers have been working non-stop either from home or school to normalize distance learning and provide the best education possible to their students. Starting in fourth quarter, teachers are scheduled to return and thus resume their normal on-campus school schedule.

However, for students to return to school, conditions would have to be as safe as possible.

"As the pandemic continues, we can't let fatigue fool us into dropping precautions to prevent the spread and stop the surge," County Health Officer and Director of the OC Health Care Agency Dr. Clayton Chau said.

The proposed plan to reinstate school, before its current cancelation, would have introduced a hybrid schedule. The proposed schedule included one day per week when students would meet for live in-person instruction. The rest of the week would consist of one day of live online synchronous learning with three days of asynchronous activities.

While on campus, there would be rigorous safety arrangements including socially distanced seats, hand sanitizer stations, and masks to be requirement.

However, there are still parents who are on the fence about idea of reopening in March.

"I think it's quite irrational," Kennedy parent Mizuky Santos said. "If the cases are rising then obviously the kids will be put in danger. It makes no sense to reopen school since they were closed based on COVID and the way to prevent COVID could possibly not even work."

Concerns like this are normal, but parents can rest assured that their children will be in safe hands when they do return to campus.

## **Campuses to Remain Closed**

MARCH 8, 2021 -- On Thursday, March 4, the Anaheim Union High School District (AUHSD) Board of Trustees reached a 4:1 decision against passing 11.1 reopening of school sites in a roll call vote. All schools within the district will continue with distance learning through the end of the 2020-21 school year.

AUHSD has remained in the purple tier since the last Board meeting on Thursday, Feb. 4, but the District expects to be in the red tier at the time when students were previously scheduled return to

The plan presented in the meeting remained the same as the last Board meeting, with a tentative timeline of staff returning to the district and school sites full time on March 8, 7th and 9th graders returning on March 31, and the remaining students remaining April 5.

The hybrid schedule included two synchronous days, Monday and Friday. The plan presented would have called for students to be split into three cohorts, where one cohort would be allowed to attend school on campus per day starting Tuesday through Thursday. All other cohorts not attending in person on a given day would work asynchronously while also attending a 2nd period check-in from

8:45-9:40 a.m.

The Board and students alike showed concern for the two additional asynchronous days each student would adapt to that began at the beginning of the second semester.

"Do we put the health of our students and their families at risk for eight days or less in person instruction?" Board Member Al Jabbar said.

He urged the rest of the board to join him in voting against the return to in-person instruction.

In a survey conducted by the District's student representatives, 66 percent of students agreed or strongly agreed that the current schedule allows more time for social activities

"These are not just numbers. They're students who had real responses to how they are feeling," Student Representative to the AUHSD Board of Trustees Elizabeth Ochei said. "I hope you're influenced by facts and not fear, regardless of the decision made here tonight. I think all students and administration and parents need support."

There has been a bit of uncertainty surrounding the return to school and what it would really be like. Some are eager to get on campus to see friends and be able to socialize, but Board members clarified that the return to school would not have been what many were hoping for.

"I just want to put out there that this is not going to be everybody getting on campus and you know you hear the bell and everyone's high fiving as people have been saying," Board Member Annemarie Randle-Trejo said. "Students are going to have to stand apart from each other, they're going to sit apart from each other. It's not really going to be a social gathering, we're going to have to spend time... teaching and learning ...the protocols,"

Despite parent concerns the Board made the final decision to not return back to campus this school year, reminding AUHSD families that regardless of everything safety comes first.

Regardless of the Board's decision, in recent weeks special populations have been able to utilize the campus while following established safety protocols. Additionally, the District made it clear that the delayed return to campus will not interfere with plans to celebrate the graduating class of 2021.

'We as a district are committed to doing some type of modified in-person graduation," Assistant Superintendent of Education Dr. Jaron Fried said. "(We) don't know yet what that's going to look like, but just know that it is something we are committing to."

While there are no details yet, the in-person graduation will be in addition to a virtual graduation.







## Finding Mexico's Government Graves

MARCH 12, 2021 -- Over the years, Mexican newspapers have been reporting on mothers looking for their lost children and finding secret graves. Now, for the first time, the federal government has revealed the number of underground locations where those who have died in Mexico's raging narco-violence have been found.

"If you're looking for a 17-year-old girl, you'll end up with a match for a 43-yearold woman," National School of Anthropology and History Yanet Juarez said.

In certain cases, the only information known on the missing is their names and ages, with no family DNA samples or other clues to help match them to remains. Just about 30 individuals were found after the state of Tamaulipas exhumed 265 cadavers and numerous boxes of bones from a public cemetery in 2018.

Since 2006, at least 40,000 inhabitants have vanished in Mexico. Officials claim the bulk of the victims were victims of organized crime. On the other hand, local or state officials may have been involved in many of these instances.

Some 80,000 Mexicans have since dis-

appeared in the last 15 years and have never been found. Many are now thought to be in government custody, among the thousands of corpses that pass through morgues each year without ever being identified, ending up in common graves. More than 28,000 bodies have been cremated or buried in public cemeteries, and another 2,589 donated to medical schools. The rest were still in morgues or could not be located.

"For years, the state abdicated its responsibility, not only to guarantee the safety of the people, but to give ... families the right to search and find and return home with their relatives," Top human rights official Alejandro Encinas said.

Until recently, the majority of the search had been carried out by victims' families, who banded together in groups to dig in desolate desert fields and on forested hills. They've been complaining for years that the government has failed to respond to their demands for assistance. Later when government officials unveiled a proposal in late 2019 to gather a team of national and foreign experts with the aim of recognizing all bodies and even bone

fragments, human rights activists applauded. However, the initiative has come to a halt as a result of the COVID-19 pandemic and the recognition that the forensic problems are much greater than anticipated.

"Few cemeteries — almost none have a good registry of the location and quantity of people who are buried there," founder of the Mexican Forensic Anthropology team said.

Any time a new corpse appears at a morgue, it is expected to be refrigerated so it can be autopsied and inventoried for

scars, tattoos, cavities, and other identifiable features. Samples of DNA are expected to be retained in case they're needed later.

The remains of the missing have been discovered in a variety of locations, including secret graves. As crime has risen in recent years, state medical examiners' offices have been overflowing with bodies. Thousands of corpses are believed to have been dumped in mass graves without being identified, we can only hope that in the future something more will be done about this.



## **Novdeep Kaur: The Imprisoned Activist**

MARCH 12, 2021 -- Navdeep Kaur, more commonly known as Novdeep Kaur, is a 23-year-old Dalit activist. She was arrested on Jan. 12 after protesting in front of Sharan Elecmech, a metal demolition company located in the Kundli Industrial Area of Haryana.

U.S. Vice President Kamala Harris' niece, Meena Harris' tweet has drawn worldwide interest to the arrest and alleged

sexual attack of a younger Indian activist.

Kaur is dealing with charges of attempted murder, extortion, and several other offenses and has two times been refused bail. She reportedly demonstrated near the new and old border, where thousands of farmers were protesting against the farm's rules. She also talks about the new and old frontiers.

"Weird to see a photo of yourself burned by an extremist mob but imagine what they would do if we lived in India. I'll tell you — 23-year-old labor rights activist Novdeep Kaur was arrested, tortured & sexually assaulted in police custody. She's been detained without bail for over 20 days," Meena Harris tweeted.

Kaur, a member of Mazdoor Adhikar Sanghatan (MAS), graduated 12 years ago and started working at a power station in Kundli, Noida. Kaur, as part of MAS, has strived to build solidarity between farmers and workers.

Rajveer Kaur, Dalit activist and sister of Novdeep, claimed her sister was sexually assaulted by a male worker at a police station, as she was injured in her genitals. Their lawyer said the doctor's report confirmed the same.

"I met her (Novdeep) on January 13 only and realized she has been subjected to police violence, including assault on her genitals that can be termed sexual violence... They [Police] accuse her of extortions. I ask, will extortion be for mere Rs 5,000? Will extortion be done by holding a protest? They have accused her under 307 IPC?" Rajvir said. "The policeman is giving interviews saying Novdeep Kaur of Punjab is extorting money for laborers. These are all fake charges. They are framing her as if my sister attacked the police station. She was the one who was beaten and dragged from there."

In India's millennial caste system, Dalits are completely outside the building. They are called "untouchable" by a form of inherited family labor passed down from generation to generation. The Dalits have been held back for centuries by culture and other Indian societies.

Novdeep Kaur claimed in her plea for bail that she was beaten, tortured, and officially detained by the police after several injuries during this period. She also claimed that she could not seek medical advice which violated Article 54 of the Criminal Procedure Code. Kaur was kept in Karnal prison, Haryana. Her case began to attract media attention after poet Rupi Kaur also announced her support on Jan. 30.

"As an Indian citizen Novdeep Kaur she had the right to protest but she was taken into custody for no reason. She was beaten and sexually assaulted by the police," Gahr High junior Gurpreet Kaur said. "The government of India tries to play with its own citizens isn't right at all. Novdeep Kaur was able to get out of jail with bail because of the awareness on social media."

Novdeep Kaur was released on Friday, Feb. 26 in the High Court murder trials in Punjab and Haryana. However, Dalit discrimination and human rights violations are still rampant in India.

#### COVID's Cheating Crisis

APRIL 23, 2021-- The recent virtual component to schooling has brought into question the honesty and integrity of students. Technological advancements have made it so practically all information is at one's fingertips making cheating on both assignments and exams more possible. Although students sign an academic honesty contract at the beginning of each school year, many faculty members have voiced their concerns and observations regarding the rising levels of plagiarism

"There seems to be many reasons for the increased cheating. First of all, I think students feel unprepared and are trying to get a good grade on an assignment, and the grade seems more important these days than actually learning or perfecting skills, English literature teacher Kimberly Weir said. "Students do not really know me, so it is much easier to be dishonest with someone you do not have to look in the eye everyday. I think students are depressed also, and they feel like the system has failed them, so they rationalize cheating."

A survey conducted by digital publishing and education company Wiley

found that 93 percent of instructors believe students are more likely to cheat

virtually rather than in person. Staff and students are unable to build a genuine relationship which would promote a more honest working environment. The major differences between the online learning environment and the in-person learning environment are factors in the distrust between staff and students when it comes to academic honesty.

'Based on my experience I've noticed that there has been an increase in cheating because students are just trying to pass rather than putting in the work due to their

lack of motivation," senior Alissa Carnes

After analyzing 79 research studies, Texas State University found a variety of motivational factors are driving the recent uptick in cheating which they published in the Educational Psychology Review. Whether the reason lies with the motivation to retain high grades or the lack of academic confidence, the key reason for cheating 'motivation.

"There's definitely been an increase in

cheating because it's much easier to cheat." Oxford Academy senior Briana Greeley said. "A lot of people I know just look up answers to tests, and teachers pretty much know this so they've stopped giving so many tests in general."

The accessibility to answers along with

convenience seem to be two more driving factors in the increase students and teachers are observing when it comes to cheating on schoolwork. With multiple avenues available for students to use, such as Chegg, Quizlet, and Sparknotes, instructors are not always able to detect academic dishonesty which adds to the lessening of trust between student and

teacher.

"While technology is an important tool in the detection of misconduct, I am concerned that entering a high-tech arms race with students will expend resources and good will that would be better spent toward improving student motivation and efficacy as learners," Microbiology assistant professor at the University of California, Davis Miriam Martin said.

Although instructors have the option of

using plagiarism detection sites such as Turnitin.com, not all do.

The noticeable surge in the number of cheating students brings into question the reason behind their actions. Whether that be the unaccountability surrounding virtual learning or the overall lack of motivation, there has been a distrust between students and staff during distance





All teachers are evaluated several times during their careers. But due to the important position which teachers hold when it comes to molding young minds and preparing them for the future, it seems wise that teachers should be evaluated more stringently.

The teachers at Kennedy are evaluated by the administration. Unfortunately, the administration does not have the daily contact with each teacher which is necessary to make an accurate judgment of the teacher's skills.

This is where students could play a large role in the evaluating process. Most students face the same five or six teachers five days a week and nine weeks in a quarter. Students become attuned to a teacher's methods and skills. It appears reasonable that students be consulted when evaluating teachers' performances in the classroom. Teachers should concern themselves with both students and the

administration.

It seems there is no clear cut solution to the problem of bad teachers not being noticed until it is too late. But giving the students a say in evaluating the teacher's performance is a step in the right direc-

On the last day of every quarter, prepared evaluation sheets could be passed out to the students in every class. Taking no more than ten minutes from class time, students could fill out the evaluation cheets

The administration could then look over the various comments and see if they are congruent with their own evaluations. In this way, the administration can obtain a more accurate depiction of a teacher's teaching skills.

Administrative evaluations alone do not come close to improving the problems of weak teachers. Student evaluations would also be in no way sufficient on their own. The two must work together to complement and add substance to each other so that appropriate action can be taken and every student can be guaranteed not only a quality education but also a quality teacher.

#### BLACK CLUBS MATTER

OCT. 6, 2016 -- The campus is full of eclectic organizations: LGBT club, Anime club, French club, LINK. With so many bodies of students uniting together with the same vision, it's easy to start a new club. Until it isn't.

This past summer, the Black Student Union (BSU), headed by co-presidents Breanna Robinson and James Carter, struggled to make its club a reality, facing obstacles as paperwork, meetings, and rumors mixed chaotically. After multiple emails surfaced regarding concerns about the formation of BSU, officiating of the club came to a staggering halt.

"It was told that maybe we shouldn't have the club, and that maybe the club was very controversial, and that if it was [the teacher], they would hold off because it would be hard to find an adviser and get people to join," BSU Vice President Tiera Barber said. "They said that it's so controversial and it's not even a club yet, and all these things are already happening."

Filing paperwork to start a club is fairly simple. A straightforward guide on the school website directs the following: find five to six students and an adviser. plan some events, write a constitution, and fill out an application. Once the district office approves, then the club is free to start calling itself an official club.

For BSU, however, instead of receiving a speedy approval as they had expected, the paperwork reportedly became missing.

"It felt like it was because of the club itself and what we were trying to do. It felt like that's why it was being delayed," BSU secretary Metrah Sadeghi said. "And that inflamed feeling that we had only intensified when we were told that it was controversial, because the faculty said that, all right, it's already problematic. And they even said it themselves."

There is no official conclusion whether or not the paperwork was received, or if the form was incomplete.

Prior to sending the form for approval, the proposed club needed the signatures of Kennedy principal Russell Earnest, the assistant principal in charge of clubs and activities (assistant principal Jack Jensen who has since transferred to Loara High), and the club adviser.

"I'm not quite sure what happened with the paperwork with Mr. Jenson not being here anymore," Earnest said. "The paperwork could have been sent off, but again, [the school] was the last to have the paperwork, so I apologized to the group about the confusion that happened."

BSU's first proposal to become an official club was filed in May of 2016. BSU initially had English teacher Jenifer Zinn as their adviser until miscommunication between herself, ASB, and BSU officers led to confusion and Zinn's departure as club adviser.

"The club was denied last year because [the paperwork] was filed late, and the deadline for me to get it to the board for approval is April," ASB adviser Sarah Anderson said. "I emailed Ms. Zinn in the beginning of this year asking her if she was still the adviser for the club, but she was confused too."

Club officers did not hear about the paperwork mix-up until two days before Club Rush: an event that encourages Kennedy students to join clubs and organizations. When BSU found out about the indignant emails, social media postings, and the delay of their club's approval in time to participate with the rest of the campus clubs, they were in shock.

Anonymous accounts created on Twitter meant to critique and antagonize the new "Black Lives Matter club" claimed to protest BSU's appearance at Club Rush, prompting faculty to preclude any official BSU campaigning on campus.

"Our entire image was presented as the 'Black Lives Matter superiority club," Sadeghi said. "And I wanted to clear the air on what the purpose of our club was, since it seemed as if everyone was misinterpreting it."

After the public's inflamed reactions in 2013 when George Zimmerman was acquitted of shooting and killing 17-year-old Trayvon Martin and the series of high-profile police killings of black persons nationwide that followed, the "Black Lives Matter" movement

(BLM), a chapter-based national group, rose in response with the goal of preventing systematic racism and brutality.

Support of the movement is singularly strong among the black community with 65 percent support, including 41 percent who strongly support it, and opposition at 12 percent; among whites, 40 percent reveal support while 28 percent say they oppose BLM according to Pew Research Center.

Those opposed to BLM respond with "All Lives Matter," a slogan that signals the notion that not only blacks, but all races should fall under the umbrella of recognition for more equality. Supporters of "All Lives Matter" are regularly criticized for minimizing issues of racism and police killings.

BLM highlights the effect of racism that induces widespread bias against blacks in the educational setting, job opportunities and security, and police brutality and violence; proponents stress BLM does not advocate the belief that other races do not matter. Instead, they focus on dismantling centuries' worth of systematic privilege and dangers affecting the black community.

"We're working to get rid of all these social taboos," Robinson said. "You shouldn't be afraid to talk about slavery. You shouldn't be afraid to talk about all the police brutality, because it's happening. It happened. It happened then, and it's happening now."

BSU aims to construct a generally open environment and forum for both black students and advocates to celebrate black culture and share opinions regarding issues impacting the African American community. During general meetings, an understanding of African American history will be developed and broad current events will be discussed.

"It isn't a political statement. It isn't a racist, anti-white gathering; it was simply created to both celebrate and support the African American community at our school and raise awareness about certain issues," Sadeghi said. "It isn't a 'Black Lives Matter ONLY' organization, which is a disturbing misinterpretation of the movement; if anything, it is a 'Black Lives Matter TOO."

Hispanics (36 percent) at the top, followed by Asians (33 percent), Whites (21 percent), Blacks (4 percent), and other minority races (6.6 percent), according to usnews.com.

Nationwide, several schools and universities have established Black Student Unions and minority clubs including states such as California, Georgia, Massachusetts, Washington, etc. A national convention is held by the Office of National Black Student Union (NBSU) with primary focus to urge Black Student Unions to pursue graduate and professional study.

Only two other schools within the Anaheim Union High School District (AUHSD), Loara High and Western High, host a Black Student Union club.

"Loara barely started a BSU this year, and it did cause some controversy," Sam Cadondon, a senior of Filipino descent, said. "I feel that it is important for us to acknowledge and embrace the black culture as equally as we embrace our own. However, BSU shouldn't be an excuse to express anger or revenge. Rather, it should be used as an opportunity to build stronger relationships amongst blacks and other races."

Earnest and the BSU officers arranged a meeting on Sept. 9 where issues surrounding the delayed paperwork and alleged accusations of black supremacy as the focus of the club were addressed.

Despite arguments against the club, Earnest believes it would be a positive addition to the school in spreading awareness for topics not necessarily welcome for casual conversation.

"I think it's great," Earnest said. "Having an active Black Student Union...provides that same kind of diversity for us."

Officers submitted their application on Sept. 9. However, signing the paperwork stating BSU is official lies in the hands of AUHSD at their next board meeting on Oct. 13. Until then, acts as a formal club and processing of any donations are not authorized. Still, Kennedy allowed BSU to promote and gather members on the center stage during lunch from Sept. 14-16.

For now, this group of student activists must wait for the final word on the legitimacy of their club to be released.

MARCH 4, 2019 -- On Feb. 5, the annual State of the Union was held in the U.S. House of Representatives. Being compelled to reopen the federal government after a 35day shutdown, President Donald Trump was invited by Speaker Nancy Pelosi to deliver the national address after previously being denied the opportunity by the House leader. Trump's speech focused on governing

through unity; however, he had also melded some contentious topics into his annual address such as the demand for a southern border wall, jabs at abortion rights, and a call to end investigations into his administration. In his speech, Trump championed females

congratulating the newly elected women of Congress. All elected women of the Democratic caucus also wore white to pay homage to the suffragette movement of the early 20th century.

'No one has benefited more from our thriving economy than women, who have filled 58 percent of the newly created jobs last year," Trump said.



We're prepared for all contingencies.'

The Houston Rockets had a game postponed because they didn't have

Head Coach Doc Rivers said. "The
concern is injuries because guys are
playing so many minutes because we don't have enough guys. I'm looking at our stat sheet, we had one, two, three guys plus-40 (minutes) and couldn't be avoided. Now, we play again in two days and then we play again. That's my concern with this, we have to be very careful how we navigate next week."

Despite these unfortunate circumstances, the main takeaway is that league protocols are working as well as they can and most teams aren't being affected by COVID-19.

"Words can not express my feelings, a friend and mentor for 52 years is no longer with us. Tommy— no one will ever fill the void you left. Thank you for everything. R.I.P." former mentee Bobby Valentine said.

Lasorda began as a manager in 1976 and won the World Series in '81 and '88 then soon officially retired in 1996 after coaching the Dodgers for 20 seasons.

MAY 24, 2021 -- On Mar. 13, 2020, the typical school experience switched from on campus to online due to the COVID-19 pandemic, leaving teachers and students to figure out the virtual environment. Soon it became clear the transition was much more tricky for unique courses opposed to core subjects. With the struggle of the online platform, The Kennedy Singers Vocal Music Program was reinvented to fit the circumstances!

The Kennedy Singers offer five vocal music classes and one after school group. world designs or they are called in the game.

One of the most desired seeds to find is the Minecraft title screen. Since it is an image that every player has to see when they launch the game, many gamers have wanted to view the sight in their own Minecraft world. Finally after nine years, the seed for the title screen has been discovered. The seed(s) are 2151901553968352745 or 8091867987493326313 and the location can be found at the specific coordinates X=61.48, Y=75, Z=-68.73. X is the horizontal axis, Y is the vertical axis, and Z is the distance north or south of the origin point of (0,0,0).

"Everyone should be familiar with this world. It's the one that always appeared on Minecraft's main-menu (title-screen), blurred and slowly rotating around," Seed Discoverer Tomlacko said.

An infamous seed has also been discovered from fans, known as "Herobrine World". Herobrine was Minecraft's own creepypasta; a made up horror story that spread through the internet. He was very much akin to Steve, the default Minecraft character with a light blue shirt and blue pants that every new player starts as. However, Herobrine has piercing white eyes but nevertheless is identical to Steve. The story extends further when fans began to state that Herobrine was actually Minecraft's creator Notch's dead brother reincarnated into the game. The Herobrine creepypasta spread like a wildfire from its origin video, "Herobrine Sighting!".

The very short video does not show much, but it did not stop avid fans from finding the seed. The seed is as follows, 478868574082066804 and its specific coordinates are X=5.16 Y=71 Z=-298.53. This Herobrine scare was debunked to be a myth, where it does not actually exist in the game and found that Notch never incorporated a dead brother into the world.

"Herobrine isn't real in any way, no. I never had a brother (well, there's a half brother I never met...), and he's not in the game," tweeted Minecraft Creator Markus "Notch" Perrson.

In a successful Minecraft run, one would hope for a world with quick and fast access to the basic necessities such as iron, diamonds, and a stronghold (to travel to the End and finish the world). There are multiple quick Minecraft seeds that enable the player to find diamonds quickly, which is by far the strongest material in the Minecraft overworld. A quick seed to get diamonds is -7629372319681445308, where you will be able to obtain 13 diamonds at the start of your journey, if you are willing to explore through a ravine. The ravine is located at -402 69 -134, and you will be able to find an area consisting of eight diamonds at -385 11 -95, with another closeby area with five diamonds at -372 13 -91.

However that is not the extent of the diamonds on this seed! At a village, there is a mine in which there are more easily accessible diamonds. The entrance to this mine is at -268 42 -669. There is a patch of five more diamonds for you to mine at -261 15 -743 and two more at -271 11 -634. Additionally in this mine, there is a minecart that also contains diamonds at -293 20 -732. After following these instructions, you will be able to be rich in materials for the rest of your adventure.

"Starting my game out with a handful of diamonds is very fun sometimes", said player Dwight Campe. "It allows me to kind of do whatever I want for a while."

With these small adjustments to your Minecraft gameplay, it's possible to experience famous sights from the Minecraft community as well as give a small boost in power at the beginning of your adventure in a brand new world.

As the show continues on, the story begins to drift to more serious topics of grief and pain, as the majority of Marvel fans and viewers know the fate of Vision in "Avengers: Infinity War" and Maximoff's powerful confrontation against Thanos in "Avengers: Endgame."

In the eighth episode, Wanda revisits her trauma with Agatha. A seemingly hopeless situation until Maximoff and the viewer stumble upon a memory of her and Vision. Paul Bettany delivered one of the most heart-warning and heart-breaking lines that has resonated with fans.

"It's all I've ever known," The Vision said in the episode titled "Previously On." "I've never experienced loss because I've never had a loved one to lose. But what is grief, if not love persevering?"

Not only does the series help the viewers understand Maximoff and Vision, they also introduce two new upcoming heroes named Billy and Tommy Maximoff, better known by their superhero names Wiccan and Speed. In "All-New Halloween Spooktacular!" Billy is dressed in his comic counterpart costume but he's dressed as a wizard while Tommy dresses like comic book Quicksilver.

"They began the day as children getting ready for their first Halloween, and ended it as superpowered preteens," journalist Daniel Chin said.

## PROPAGANDA PROB

APRIL 30, 2021 -- Marvel Studios made \$22.2 billion through box office revenue in 2020-during the most tolling economic depressions since the 2008 recession due to COVID-19.

These lavish films make billions, but they also cost billions to produce leading some to wonder how Marvel Studios has been able to stay afloat during these difficult times.

A popular theory is that the American military, as well as the C.I.A., supports and funds many of the "pro-America" Marvel Studios products such "Captain American" and "Agents of SHIELD."

"Propaganda films are generally associated with faraway and destitute countries, made by tyrannical governments in scary-sounding places such as Soviet Russia, but they have a long history of being funded in America," student journalist Anna Banerjee said. "America so strongly with ideals of freedom and democracy,

it is often hard to admit that governments and political powers have strong hands on the mass media we happily enjoy and flock to in the hundreds of thousands."

Recently, the Flag-Smasher, an anti-nationalist advocate for global liberation, has been introduced into the Marvel Cinematic Universe.

The Flag-Smasher character made it's first appearance in Captain America #312 (December 1985) as the male figure name Karl Morgenthau. In the streaming show "The Falcon and the Winter Soldier," the character takes on a feminine role (Karli Morgenthau) as she collides with the two central characters Bucky Barnes (Winter Soldier) and Sam Wilson (Falcon).

The trouble is that Karli is presented as a villain. How is it possible that a character that advocates for freedom and anti-oppression is portrayed as an awful person when America prides itself on being "the land of the free?"

Morgenthau's values are those of a far-left ideology. America and its Western allies chose to be isolationist in the means of foreign aid and having a character that opposes that is good bait for American audiences to disapprove of that as well.

Using anti-left propaganda has been a common trope in many pro-American nationalist tales, such as the in the film "Red Dawn." In the film, there are countless comparisons to Communists and Nazis such as in the scene when young girls are hidden under a floorboard so they wouldn't get raped by Soviet guards. In the case of Morgenthau, the same is done.

American propaganda uses a tool of anti-anti-Semitism in order to make it seem that Americans welcome those of the Jewish faith and continue the myth that Americans alone were the ones who won WWII. By portraying anything radical to the left as anti-Semitic, the American propaganda machine upholds the lie all the while hoping viewers don't realize the comparison in itself is anti-Semitic.

The comparison is just another subtle

da perpetuates a white nationalist state.

"The Bush administration wanted to get Hollywood filmmakers to rally around the flag, reminiscent of the early days of World War One and World War Two," Digital Study and Communications Professor Tanner Mirrlees said. "A spokesperson for the Bush administration said: 'I have great respect for the industry and its ability to educate at home and abroad.' As if war films are about public education."

Marvel has smart marketing though, bringing in topics of racial justice while carefully ignoring true themes of Black liberation and other pro-socially left ideas. The casual LGBTQ+ member is thrown in to keep audiences happy and their problem is solved.

However. with these giant war movies, the narrative of pro-military is carefully calculated, sometimes criticizing small aspects of war while ignoring the bigger picture. Marvel choses topics a general consensus would disagree with all while upholding way how C.I.A.-funded Marvel propagan- the very strong American value system.


